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Laws, Rights & Responsibilities.

(Sexuality & learning disability. A guide to supporting continuing professional development. Zarine Katrak & Claire Fanstone FPA 2011)

- People with learning disabilities have the same rights and responsibilities in law as any other person.
- Exclusions may apply to people with severe learning disabilities who are deemed unable to give consent in law.
- Their rights are not automatically transferred to carers but in consultation with a range of professionals, decisions can be made about what is in the best interests of the person with learning disabilities.
- ► The Equality Act 2010 broadens the Equality Act 2006 to include a new equality duty that continues to cover race, gender and disability, and has been extended to cover age, sexual orientation, religion/belief, pregnancy & maternity and gender reassignment.






Relationships and Sexual Health Education(RSHE)

- Now compulsory for all schools Primary & Secondary September 2020
- Different models and different approaches are used for each individual site to meet the needs of their students
- Students with learning disabilities are often no where near being sexually active in their school years and will need this information covering again when the situations that RSHE involves become a reality. This much needed service is not readily available once the young person has left their educational setting. This work needs multi-agency input.

Setting the ideal scene to deliver RSE

- Often your client group have such different additional needs that it is not possible to deliver RSE in a group
- Individual RSE lessons have to be planned specifically to the individual student
- They often require being repeated.
- Adequate time must be allowed for delivery, it cant be rushed.
- All staff involved should have seen the lesson plan in good time prior to delivery
- ldeally it should not be delivered on a 1-1 but preferably with a third party to ensure safety
- Find out prior what words and terminology your student/s are familiar with and using around sexuality.
- If possible give students a post it note to enable discreet questions to be asked.
- A quiet area/room with no/minimal disruption
- Agreed ground rules/boundaries
- Allow time afterwards for questions from both students/staff.
- Ensure guardians/carers/staff know that the students have been discussing RSE so that they are prepared for any questionsno surprises.
